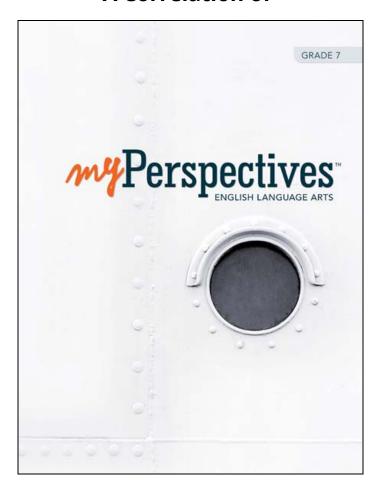

Introduction
